

A KING, A CASTLE AND A MUDDY POOL

The description of one-time Liverpool Castle in March *Focus* concluded with a question: What prompted King John to build Liverpool Castle?

CHAPTER II: An Irish Question

On his accession to the English



throne in 1199, King John found himself surrounded by enemies, at home by rebellious Anglo-Norman barons and abroad by a French expansionist King, Philip Augustus. A French invasion supported by Anglo-Norman barons threatened England. The security of the nation was John's top priority. Where necessary, he ordered the construction of new castles or the improvement of existing structures. His quest for national security extended to the vassal provinces of Scotland, Wales and Ireland.

Ireland was foremost in John's mind. Its worsening security prompted him to revise his attitude towards the province. As a young prince he had visited Ireland in 1189 when he insulted Irish lords by tugging at their long beards and committing other juvenile outrages. Since then, the province had increasingly fallen into the hands of Anglo-Norman adventurers and rival Irish warlords. They all sought to carve out principalities for themselves, chiefly at the expense of indigenous Irish people. One eminent historian, Marc Morris, has described the province as "the Wild West of the British Isles, an unruly frontier territory, where new lordships were carved out at sword-point." Warfare was constant.

With the support of Irish lords loyal to the English crown, John was determined to assert his overlordship of Ireland, intending to attach the province firmly to the English crown and to impose the common law of England and the English system of justice on its people.

By 1206 John had decided to mount a major expedition to Ireland, but first needed to find a secure port from which to embark troops, supplies and reinforcements. He favoured Milford Haven in Pembrokeshire, but was fearful that the port might be overrun by Welsh princes who were gaining strength. He sought a safer port with easy access to the Irish Sea. Chester seemed the obvious choice, but it was part of the fiefdom of Ranulph, Earl of Chester. Brought up together as children in the court of John's father, King Henry II, Ranulph and John maintained an uneasy relationship throughout their lives, sometimes friends, sometimes enemies. John instructed his advisers to find a reliable alternative port on the coast of Northwest England.

The advisers set off from Winchester, soon to be replaced by London as the seat of English government, and journeyed north. They crossed the river Mersey at Warrington, then followed the north bank of the river through the ancient townships of Garston, Aigburth and Toxteth until they reached the point where the river narrowed, before becoming a fast -moving estuary joining the Irish Sea. Here, at the river's narrowest point, they found a tidal inlet or pool, fed at its eastern end by a small stream that tumbled down from the green hills above the old village of Everton into the pool which filled and emptied with the tide. At high tide, the pool provided a deep and sheltered harbour for up to twelve ships. The pool flowed along present-day Whitechapel and Paradise Street to Canning Place, emptying into the Mersey at the Strand. The Everton stream, named Moss Lake Brook, entered the pool somewhere near the present entrance to the Queensway tunnel. Overlooking the pool was a long broad ridge on the line of present-day Old Hall Street, High Street, Exchange Flags and Castle Street, rising to a rocky hillock, now Derby Square.

A Muddy Pool

John's advisers found no sign of human habitation in the area, apart from a few fishing huts immediately above the pool in what is now St John's Gardens. Beyond these primitive structures there was nothing but fields, woods and a few pastures. They found out that the area was known locally as "Liver" or "Lever" pool, meaning in Old English "a muddy" pool, an apt name for a tidal inlet, not unlike our own river Alt. Cormorants may have patrolled the inlet, but sadly, the name does not denote the habitat of extinct or mythological Liver birds! More of the Liver Birds later ...

King John's advisers presented him with a favourable report on Liverpool's suitability as a port for his Irish expedition.

The next chapter will reveal John's reaction to this discovery of Liverpool.



From Lizzie's Kitchen Easiest Chicken Dish Ever

You can cook this easy peasy dish even when you come in from work exhausted. It's easy to prepare, takes only 30 minutes to cook and there's usually enough to freeze for another evening. Better still, make it ahead and have it

ready for those evenings when you're just too tired to cook at all. Use the highest welfare chicken that you can afford.

Ingredients

1 tablespoon garlic oil
1 onion finely chopped
500g chicken thigh fillets, cut into 3rds
1 x 400g can chopped tomatoes
1 x 400g can cannellini beans (optional)

75g smoked lardons 1/2 tsp dried rosemary 1/2 tsp celery salt 125ml white wine 2 x bay leaves

Method

Heat the garlic oil in a large saucepan, fry the lardons until golden and then add the onion, continue on heat to soften the onion.

Add the chicken pieces, stirring continuously and sprinkle in the celery salt and the rosemary.

Pour in the wine and let it come to a bubble before adding the tomatoes and bay leaves. Put the lid on and let the mixture simmer for 20 minutes.

Drain the cannellini beans and add to the pan. When they have warmed through, your dish is ready to serve.

Serves 4 Serve with crusty bread or couscous. Yum!

N.B.

Any type of bean can be used e.g. pinto, butter, chick peas, kidney.



Continuing our exploration of Hightown in times past


Buildings and Houses


From 1906 to 1914 Joe Bulman's father built School Road and Lower Alt Road. The three houses, beyond the war memorial, on the left hand side of Lower Alt Rd as you walk to the river were sold —number 11 for £400, number 13 for £500 and number 15 for £575. Number 15 was sold to a, then young, Mr and Mrs Crane. As a child, I



knew Mrs Crane as 'Granny Crane', she was a courtesy grandma. She had been a tiller girl in The Crane Theatre, (later known as The Neptune Theatre), Liverpool, where she had met her husband, whose family owned the theatre and a music shop of the same name. Granny Crane's husband had had a 'ride on' railway built around the garden of number 15, or as we knew it, Sunset Corner. The tracks were laid on the tops of the sand dunes all around the garden. Granny Crane had one daughter, Joan, who attended Streatham House School and who, as an adult, once again lived there with her own family from approximately 1970 until 1977.

According to Miss Scott's book, prior to the 1914/18 war, apart from Rose Cottage, built around 1600, there were no houses built either in Sandy Lane or Elmcroft Lane. The fields were just a happy hunting ground for a tremendous number of rabbits. Before houses were built in Elmcroft Lane, the fields were called The Yeomanry Fields by the Hightown men who belonged to this regiment. They used the fields for their exercises and later they were used as a camp for Kitchener's Army during 1914/18. The band leader of Kitchener's Army, stationed here, was a man called Ancliffe, who was well known as the composer of the popular waltz of that time, 'Nights of Gladness'. Later, he composed a song entitled 'April Buds', whilst walking up and down Sandy Lane.
